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- AWO Düsseldorf supports displaced young people four to five hours a day, five days a week.
- The project is offered to all those whose asylum application is being processed. It is intended to help make use of the “waiting” time.
- In particular, this time allows displaced young people to gain knowledge about the training and jobs market and to begin developing their career prospects.
- Spaces to learn and practice are offered that go beyond the normal scope (for example, of a language course).
- Displaced young people remain in the project for four to six months.
- After completing the programme, they receive their own certificate.

Target group

- Displaced young people whose residency status is still unclear.
- Refugees from the AWO refugee centres.
- Accompanied young refugees up to 18 years of age.
- Young adult refugees up to 27 years of age.

Goal of the project

- Facilitating entry into the job market
- Promoting the integration and participation of young refugees
- Establishment of supportive cooperations and networks

Specific support

For example, cultural differences and other aspects are discussed with the refugees on two of the weekdays. These include:

- Expansion of German language skills
- Knowledge of the German labour market
- Support with managing personal problems
- Introduction to various support bodies
- Interaction with administrative offices and institutions
- Using public transport
- Career guidance

Introduction and experience

On the three remaining weekdays, the focus is on getting to know and gaining practical experience in various professions (trades).

Some job profiles are not so well known in the young persons' home countries or take on a different form. The knowledge gained in the project helps with orientation on the training and employment market.

During practical work, emphasis is placed on conveying industry-specific terminology.
